The 8 x 10 inch photo is a gelatin silverpoint, black and white infrared photo taken in 2000. It was exhibited with ECVA in 2001 in the Out of Darkness Into Light Exhibit. It is of the Church of the Holy Sepulcher, Jerusalem.

Of the photo, the Bishop writes: "Altar does not just have light as a theme, but it is a place where light once again shines in the aftermath of deep darkness. is a picture of hope in place which has experienced evil. Darkness only seemed to overtake the light, but the light continues to shine.



Altar was taken in the Church of the Holy Sepulcher in Jerusalem at an altar between Golgotha and the grave."

Bishop Logue is a former newspaper photographer and Contributing Editor for Shutterbug Magazine who continues to shoot, particularly fine art black and whites which he processes and prints by hand. He has more recently branched out into videos. Bishop Logue is also our featured artist for this issue.



## A Letter from our President, Pentecost, 2022

As we move into the season of Pentecost, or Ordinary Time, several images come to mind and, as artists, we all tend to think in images. I see images of doves descending, flames, wind, breath, and people speaking in many languages. As a retired French teacher, the image of people who speak different languages is strong. I have spent a lifetime teaching the importance of listening to others, to understand the nuances of their language, and the cultural differences that often come about because of language usage. (And that is my plug for why we desperately need foreign languages taught in every school in this country.)

The first skill any of us ever encounter in learning our native language or another language is the skill of listening, and it is this skill that is the most difficult as we attempt to move toward fluency and understanding. So many people today simply don't take the time or extend the courtesy of simply listening, listening to others, listening to ourselves, listening to the voice of God. As an artist, I have decided to lead a Conversations series this summer for painters on contemplative painting. Together, we will paint, we will listen to each other, and we will listen to the voice of God in our work. I hope some of you will join us.

As the artists of ECVA, we are beginning to use our Conversations platform more and more. We had a lovely virtual reception for our artists of our recent Sacrament and Image Exhibition, and we also had an excellent and informative presentation by Tobias Haller on the process of creating a series. So, throughout the summer, we will be continuing these conversations with two new Conversations series, one is the contemplative painting which I just mentioned, and the other, is a wonderful opportunity for our photographers. Sally Brower is going to be leading a series of discussions for our photographers. Information on both groups is included in the newsletter.

And, speaking of photography, we have a beautiful new exhibition almost ready online. Curated by Cathy Kerr, this exhibition highlights the very talented photographers among us.

I hope this season of Pentecost brings you the gift of seeing God in yourself and all around you and the gift of hearing the voice of God in all the silence and all the noise.

# Featured Artist The Rt. Rev. Frank Logue



Artist Statement:

Photography is in my rule of life. My commitment is to take three photos a week that mean something to me. This spiritual discipline does not turn into a frantic hunt for something to photograph, but instead results in giving keener attention to the world around me. I usually have a few cameras in the car with me in addition to my iPhone and usually stop once in any long drive across the Diocese of Georgia to take a photo. This practice

has opened my eyes more fully to where I get to serve as a Bishop of the church.

In addition to photography, I have occasionally across the past decade created stencils for spray paint art. When I had an art park, where graffiti was permitted, I would tag them there. Now I paint the pieces on to plywood. I have enjoyed the ways in which this spray paint art has assisted me in sharing not just what I see in my travels, but what I see only in my minds eye.


Bio

I gravitated toward photography in high school as a way of showing how I see the world. This led to working in photography through college for both Georgia Southern University and the local newspapers. I left college to work for two daily newspapers, the Warner Robins Daily Sun and the Rome News Tribune, and then as an Art Director for a non-profit. During that time, I did a lot of work for the Associated Press in Georgia. My wife, Victoria, and I hiked the Appalachian Trail in 1988 and began writing magazine articles and books about hiking and travel. In response to a too-long ignored call, I attended Virginia Theological Seminary. On graduating in 2000, Victoria, our daughter Griffin, and I worked with others to found King of Peace Episcopal Church in Kingsland, Georgia. I served for a decade as Canon to the Ordinary of the Diocese of Georgia and since 2022 as the diocesan bishop.

#### Vines in House




#### PB at Detention Center

Many years later, his 'Quick Icons' and 'Aaronic Blessing' series are well-known and have inspired many. Haller's 'Quick Icons' evolved from his role as a workshop teacher, and use colored paper and colored pencils. He draws his subjects from biographies in the Book of Lesser Feasts and Fasts 2018 (Church Publishing, 2019, ISBN: 1640652345). When available, Haller will use photographic references, and when his subject is a classic saint, he will look for images that match his image of who the saint is.




ECVA Conversations for Photographers With Sally M. Brower, PhD Creative-at-large
